### **OCTOBER 2025**

#### "Reading the Bible"

Throughout the years of my non-retired ministry, I often began the fall sessions of the confirmation classes with a couple of sessions in which the young people got acquainted with (and/or re-acquainted with) the Bible - its chronology, books, major characters, etc. With October being a month in which the Bible is especially



lifted up, because of its centrality in the history of the Reformation, I thought it might be helpful to share some thoughts with you on "how to get started" reading the Bible.

It is important to have a good starting place when reading the Bible. Since the Scriptures tell us that Jesus Christ is the Word of God made flesh, starting with **Jesus** is probably the best place to start reading. (Remember: The Bible is a collection, or a library, of 66 different books and writings. So you don't have to read them in order! In fact, it may not be that helpful to do so. If you do read them in order, you may very well not make it past Leviticus!)

1) Start with one of the gospels. John sets forth Jesus as the Son of God and the Son of Man. John selects a few events and builds on them. Mark is a good choice for catching the main events of Jesus' life - but there is no Christmas story. One of Matthew's strengths is his "grouping" of Jesus' teachings - the Sermon on the Mount, parables of the Kingdom. The "last days/end times" section is more direct and more easily understood than the book of Revelation. Luke's account may be the clearest one of Jesus' ministry to the weak, the suffering, the outcast, and those in need.

- 2) Then dip into the Old Testament. Read Genesis. The first chapters give the creation stories. (Yes, there is more than one creation story in the Bible and they are different from each other!) The stories of Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, and Joseph start at the twelfth chapter. Exodus shares the Old Testament story of salvation. You will read about the life of Moses, the rescue of the Hebrew slaves from Egypt, the origin of the Passover Feast, and the giving of the Ten Commandments. There are lots of other important stories in the Old Testament. Picking just one important figure, read Second Samuel for the story of David.
- 3) Head back to the New Testament. Acts is a history of the first Christians the beginning of the Church. Then read some of the letters the correspondence between Christians in the years after Jesus' resurrection. Galatians builds on the history of Acts. It includes the clear gospel of grace and faith and offers practical advice for those who are blessed with the Spirit of God. Philippians is brief, gentle, and joyful. It is a loving letter of encouragement to follow the mind of Christ. Ephesians just soars in its description of God's plan to bring all of humanity together in Jesus Christ. The fourth, fifth, and sixth chapters are excellent in addressing relationships between and among Christians. Romans is seen by many as the heart of the letters of the New Testament. It probably isn't the one to start with but get there!

Others: First John - lifts up the love of God. First Thessalonians - what Christ's second coming means for us today. First Corinthians - primarily talks about specific problems in the church.

The Bible is a gift - and shares so many gifts. But depending on where you start reading, you might not recognize the gifts as such.

I encourage you to read, listen to, and receive God's Word through the Bible. As we will hear proclaimed on Reformation Sunday, Jesus said: "If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free!" This is my prayer for each of us.

#### Tri Church Corner: Cledy's House of Hope

This past spring and summer, Cledy's House of Hope in Rock Falls, a sober living facility for women, was a God's Work Our Hands project for Tri Church. Some members painted at the facility, while others donated items. In

June, Ashley, a staff member from Cledy's, shared her story in a Sunday morning temple talk. Tri Church has committed to continuing its partnership with Cledy's.

There is so much to learn about Cledy's. The plan moving forward is to have bimonthly information about Cledy's in a question & answer format.

#### Who can live at Cledy's?

• Women 18 years of age and older who are serious about finding long-term recovery from substance abuse (for example – alcohol, drugs, prescription medication).

#### How long can a woman live at Cledy's?

• The program is structured to last around a year but may take an individual less or more time depending on their personal situation. Together with their recovery coach, a personalized recovery plan is developed.

## How does a woman get into Cledy's House of Hope to benefit from its program?

• Staff recommend that a woman transition from the completion of an inpatient program or graduate/transition from another sober living facility. A woman currently involved in an intensive outpatient program or other recovery program may also be eligible. A letter of recommendation is required from their counselor or caseworker followed by a completed application and a \$50 application fee that covers their background check and drug test upon entrance to Cledy's.

#### Northern IL Synod 2025 Focus



The experience of God's love in one's life is a gift the growing disciple feels compelled to share with others. One way our faith becomes active is when we put into words what God has done for us. Words of witness and acts of genuine hospitality directed toward our neighbors create the opportunity through which the Holy Spirit brings others into a relationship with Christ and with the church.

Giving begins with compassion.

A compassionate heart moves us toward generous giving.

When have you given out of compassion? What situations or people stir your compassion most deeply? How have you experienced someone else's compassion in a way that changed you?

Throughout Scripture, we see people whose compassion leads them to act generously by caring for their neighbors and strengthening their community. The Good Samaritan tends the wounds of a stranger and pays for his care (Luke 10:29–37). Jesus, moved by compassion for a hungry crowd, multiplies loaves and fishes so that all are fed and satisfied (Mark 6:34–44).

The churches of Macedonia give beyond their means out of compassion for fellow believers in Jerusalem (2 Corinthians 8–9).

In each of these stories, compassion is at the heart of generosity. Yet it is not compassion for its own sake. It flows from a deep awareness of the grace we ourselves have received from God.

When have you been motivated to give because you cared about the welfare of the community? When has the generosity of someone else moved you to give?

As disciples, we give compassionately because God has first been generous with us: in love, mercy, and grace. Our generosity is a response to that gift. By opening our hands and hearts, we reflect Christ's love, so that others may encounter the compassion and love of God through us.

Who in your community is God calling you to see with compassion right now? How might your generosity allow someone else to experience the compassion of

God? What resources (time, skills, money) has God entrusted to you that you can share with others? What small step of generosity can you take this week?
